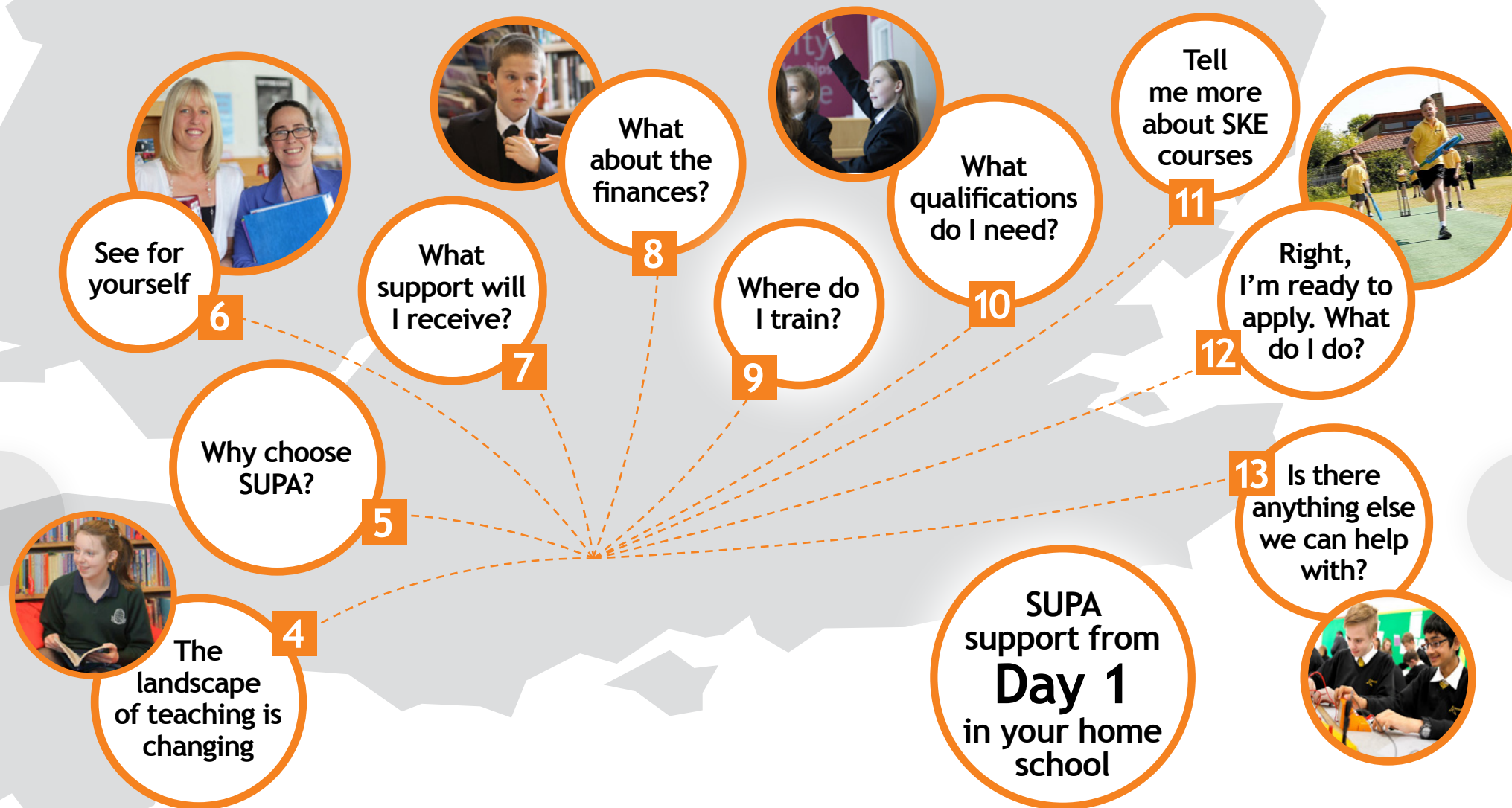

With the SUPA experience, you will spend the first weeks of your training in your home school. You will get to know your new colleagues, and your new school, before experiencing the work of another school for three months.

Your main practice in your home school will be from January to June. Throughout the year, you will also attend the University of Southampton with other trainee teachers. This gives you access to the best training available and to a network of trainee teachers who can support and help you.

All our home schools have a proven passion for developing new entrants into the profession. They have worked with the University of Southampton for many years and provide strong and knowledgeable guidance which will help you grow into a highly employable secondary teacher.

Once you are qualified, our trainees usually find a job locally within the alliance.

The good news is there has never been a better time to train as a teacher. Depending on your qualifications, and the course you choose, there are tax-free bursaries and loans and grants available while you train.

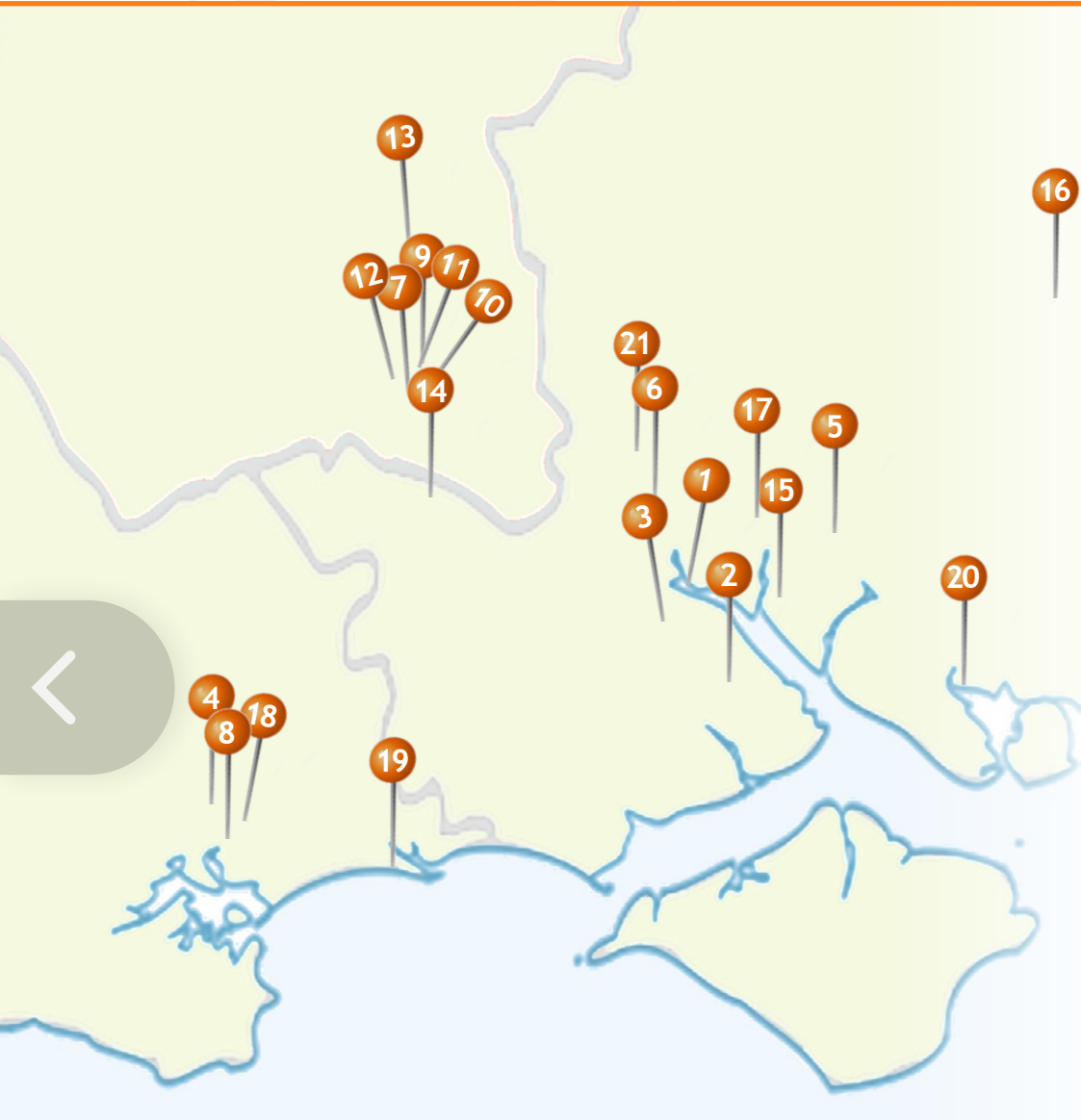

OK, I'm interested. What qualifications do I need?

It's really simple.

We require a minimum of:

- Grade C GCSE in maths and English, or equivalent.
- a good honours degree
- some classroom experience.

If you've got that nailed, you can submit an application via [UCAS](#).

Before you start your course with us, we'll ask you to take professional skills tests in numeracy and literacy - that's a national requirement. All intending teachers have to pass the tests.

If you're keen but think you need a bit of subject support, a Subject Knowledge Enhancement course could be for you.

Tell me more about Subject Knowledge Enhancement (SKE) courses

We want to get the best teachers into our classrooms. This means supporting every trainee teacher who has the potential to deliver great lessons and inspire the next generation.

We offer opportunities, through completing a University of Southampton Subject Knowledge Enhancement course prior to your PGCE, to train to teach computer science, mathematics, biology or physics, even if you don't currently have the required qualifications or detailed knowledge.

Perhaps you have a degree that is closely related, but not identical, to your preferred subject. You might be a graduate with a relevant A-level, but not a degree in the subject you would like to teach.

Or you might need some help transferring your professional experience into a classroom environment.

Whatever the reason, a Subject Knowledge Enhancement course is ideal if you have the right qualities and enthusiasm to teach one of these subjects, but just need some additional subject support.

The courses are delivered in-house by our recognised experts, are fully funded - you won't pay tuition fees - and you may be eligible for a bursary of up to £5,600 to support you through your course.

Courses are between 12 and 28 weeks long depending on your subject, qualifications and experience.

How are you finding the course?

I have just started the SUPA PGCE course, specialising in secondary English. The course is well organised and expectations are clear. The lectures are all delivered by academics who are passionate, not only about their subject, but also about teaching generally.

Is there anything else we can help with?

Q. There are a range of teacher training courses on offer. How would you describe this one?

A. We offer a School Direct (Training) course. It's targeted at graduates, recent and experienced, who want to train locally to become a secondary teacher.

Q. How much are the fees for the course?

A. Fees vary so please email the university at supa@soton.ac.uk to find out the fees for the course you're interested in.

Q. With a School Direct (Training) course I don't get a salary. How do I pay the fees and afford to live?

A. You may be eligible for a tax-free bursary to help with fees and living costs. The [Department for Education](#) has more detailed information.

Q. Is there any other financial support available?

A. There are various other [loans and schemes](#) on offer to support you.

Q. I have GCSEs in English and mathematics. Do I still need to do the Professional Skills Tests?

A. Yes. All applicants are required to pass the [Professional Skills Tests](#) before they begin their training.



Q. How is the SUPA School Direct course different to the University Led course?

A. It offers the best of both worlds - close links with a SUPA 'home' school and the benefits of the university-led training course.

Q. Do I need some classroom experience?

A. Yes. We expect all our applicants to have spent about a week in a classroom. We can help you get that experience, and there is a [School Experience Programme](#) which is very useful.

Q. Can I do the course part-time?

A. No, they are all full-time courses.

Q. I need to complete a personal statement. What do I include?

A. Tell us why you want to be a teacher. Demonstrate that you understand what being a teacher is all about. Share your experiences of working with young children, what you learned from your classroom visit and what you bring to the profession.

Q. What are your Training Provider Codes?

A. SUPA Salisbury is 1FZ and SUPA Southampton 2BH.

Q. Where do I apply?

A. You start by going to the [UCAS site](#) and search for SUPA.

Q. Do I have to arrange my own school placement for when I train?

A. No. We will arrange both of your placements for you.

Q. Will I gain Masters credits?

A. Yes. Our courses are Masters level. Most of our trainees gain 30 ECTS credits, a third of a Masters degree, from the University of Southampton. You can complete the Masters degree in your own time over the next few years.

Q. Am I guaranteed a job at my school when I qualify?

A. No. But every year well over 90% of our PGCEs are employed as teachers, many in our partnership schools.
